



Marriage and Blessing of a Marriage for the Berkeley Benefice

Welcome

Many congratulations on your engagement, and we are delighted to welcome you to one of our churches for your marriage or blessing services. A wedding or blessing (also known as a Service of Prayer and Dedication) in church is personal, meaningful, spiritual and beautiful, just as you want it to be. An exciting and happy time lies ahead and there will be much to think about.

This guide is intended to help you prepare for your big day, not to become engrossed in planning the smallest details, but to help you enjoy a relaxed and happy moment as you move into a new stage in your life together. It includes a sample Order for a marriage and a blessing service, together with suggested hymns and readings. You will also find details on the charges for Weddings and Blessings for the current year, 2023.

Weddings and blessings are normally taken by the Priest in Charge, or a retired clergy person from the benefice. In this guide the person taking the service is referred to as "the Minister". If you have any questions relating to this guide or about marriage in the Church of England, please contact the Benefice Priest in Charge:

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How can I be married in church?

You should receive this with an application form for marriage or blessing, or you can download a copy from our website (https://www.berkeleybenefice.co.uk/weddings-blessings.html). Please contact then contact the Priest in Charge to book a meeting to confirm ID and secure the date.

There are certain things which must be in place for a church wedding to ensure that the marriage complies with both UK civil and church law. You can be married in the Berkeley Benefice if you 18 years old or over (16 years old and over with parental consent), and can qualify under one of the following three conditions:

(1)You live in one of our three parishes - Please check with the minister that you live within the parish boundary.

(2) You have a "qualifying connection" - this is specifically

- Though Baptism either applicant was previously baptized in the parish
- Through Confirmation either applicant was previously prepared for confirmed in the parish and their confirmation was entered into the parish confirmation book
- Through Marriage of Parent or Grandparent a parent or grandparent of either applicant had been previously married under the rites of the Church of England in the Parish.
- Through a Parent's habitual worship a parent or grandparent of either applicant had habitually worshipped in the Parish for at least 6 months during the applicant's lifetime.
- (3)Or you commit to building a connection though regularly attending worship If you do not have a connection under one or more of the above, we can only marry you in a church in the Parish is you build a connection through regular worship. The expectation of regular worship would be an attendance at worship at least monthly for a minimum of 6 consecutive months.

It will be our Benefice policy to require applicants for the Blessing of a Marriage to have or establish the same connection as a couple applying to be married. If you cannot confirm or establish your connection as above, we will not be able to continue with your marriage or blessing. Please contact the minister immediately if this is the case.

Marriage in church after divorce

Your church wishes you a lifetime of love that grows within God's protection. But we recognise that some marriages do fail for all sorts of sad and painful reasons. So in certain circumstances the Church of England accepts that a divorced person may marry again in church and this has been the case since 2002.

The first step is to make an enquiry with the Minister of the church where you'd like to marry. If you wish to proceed, both of you should complete the Marriage after Divorce application form and return it to the Minister. You will also need to bring with you written legal proof that the divorce decree is absolute. (A decree nisi will not be sufficient.)

We may need to hold more than on confidential interview with you, and in some cases, we may need to consult with the Bishop, or their advisors, before making a decision. Even if it is not possible to do your wedding, we may offer a blessing service after a civil wedding.

Banns of Marriage

It is a legal requirement that "banns" are read before a marriage. This means the names of the couple are read during the main church service on three consecutive weeks during the three months prior to your wedding. People are asked to declare if they know any reason why you should not marry. It is also an opportunity for our church congregations to pray for you as you prepare for your wedding. The minister will confirm the dates when your banns will be read, and do please join us on those Sundays if you can.

If you live in the parishes of Berkeley with Breadstone, Wick & Newport, Stone & Woodford, or Hill: we will read your banns in the church in which you will be married. If you live outside the parishes of Berkeley with Breadstone, Wick & Newport, Stone & Woodford, or Hill are marrying by "qualifying connection": we will read your banns in the church in which you will be married. BUT you must also have your banns read in the parish church(es).

We must have the Banns Certificates prior to the wedding otherwise it cannot go ahead. It is very simple, but absolutely essential – and it is easily forgotten.

There may be occasion due to your circumstances when we will be unable to read Banns of Marriage but may require an additional process such as a Common License, the Minister will be able to guide you through this process, however, there may be additional cost you will be required to pay such as a Diocesan Registrars fee.

Planning your service, and your life together

Between booking your wedding date and the day itself we would like to invite you to find just one day to spend thinking about the future of your marriage and life together. Even if you have been together some time, from experience we know that this day of reflection will give you some tools and strategies. Focusing on these, rather than getting lost in the detail of the wedding day, will help you build a strong and lasting relationship.

Our planning days will usually be on a Sunday, giving an opportunity to visit the church for worship (useful for those establishing a connection), enjoy a lunch and spend the afternoon planning your big day. We aim to run a planning day for summer weddings (May to September) in January and for winter weddings (October to April) in June. We will write to invite you to the appropriate day for you. We strongly recommend that you make this day a priority as we may not be able to offer one to one support at busy times. It is also the opportunity to run through your service with the minister as we may not be able to prepare couples and their services individually.

What happens next?

Read this guide together, and discuss the choices you can make about the service and arrangements for your wedding day. Also read the order of service carefully, and talk about what the declarations and vows will mean to you both.

There is a list of the current fees at the back of the booklet, please be aware that fees change at the beginning of each year, and you will be notified of the fees which apply to you at the beginning of the year of your special day.

Service booklet

You will probably want to produce a service booklet ("order of service") for your guests. The minister will supply you with a copy of the outline order of service. You can then fill in the details of the music, hymns, readings etc. You should show a draft copy of the completed booklet to the minister before printing. Please print enough for all your guests and also welcome but uninvited friends, and for the choir if needed. Please bring all the service booklets to the rehearsal, so we have them in church ready for your wedding day. If someone is writing you a poem, then please send a copy for the Minister to see beforehand.

9 Steps to your wedding day

- Step 1 Application for Marriage or Blessing & paying a deposit, to book the date.
- Step 2 First Conversation with the Minister
- Step 3 Decide the keys roles
- Step 4 Attend the Wedding preparation day & confirm the extras for your big day.
- Step 5 Write your service order
- Step 6 Arrange any necessary Banns of Marriage
- Step 7 Meet with the Minister to check your service order and detail
- Step 8 Attend services when your Banns of Marriage are being read
- Step 9 Arrange your wedding rehearsal

Rehearsal

The minister will arrange a rehearsal in the church just before the wedding. You will need to check with the minister who, besides yourselves, should attend. Please bring the printed orders of service to the wedding rehearsal.

Photography & Video Recording

We will do our best to help your photographer produce a memorable record of the day, but it is essential that they consult with the minister performing the wedding service. Usually they are allowed to take photographs during the service but not during the declarations, vows or address. Flash photography is not permitted at any time within the church building.

We permit video-recording of the service, provided we are notified in advance. The recordist will have to sign the disclaimer, and must comply with the instructions given by the minister. They must be static throughout the service. We strongly recommend that you hire a professional recordist, but whoever does it, an additional fee is payable to comply with copyright law. Please ensure that the recordist has a copy of the disclaimer form and has completed and returned it to the minister before the wedding.

Flowers

You are welcome to arrange of your choice of floral decoration in the church for your service. We can arrange access for you on the evening before your service as long as the building is not being used for any other event or service. Please check with the minister for times of access. We ask that all floral decorations, and other items used in the service are removed before the end of the day of the service.

The day of the service

We aim to provide for you, your family and your friends the very best experience of a wedding or blessing in church. The minister and team will do their utmost to help you with planning and preparation, however, there is some things you can begin to think about.

Timings

Please ensure you plan the day so that the groom arrives at least 45 minutes before the service and the bridal party arrives promptly. Late arrival causes considerable inconvenience to guests, the officiating minister and to all those supporting you on your wedding day. If there is a delay of more than 30 minutes due to a late arrival we will have to allow the organist, choir and bell ringers to leave but will continue with the legal service. A delay of more than 45 minutes without good reason will lead to the cancelation of the service.

A wedding or blessing service usually lasts around 45 minutes but should you require the addition of Communion or a Baptism, please allow an extra 30 minutes to your schedule for the day.

Verger

Our Vergers are very experienced and are there to help your Ushers or Groomsmen, and assist the minister. Any weddings with 150 guests or more, will need two vergers on duty (and you will be charged accordingly).

Witnesses

Choose two people to be witnesses, to sign the marriage document with you. The minister will need a note of their forename and surname before the day. There are no requirements about the gender or age of witnesses, or their relationship to you, but preferably over the age of 18.

Ushers

The ushers will be supported by our "Wedding Verger" (s/he is a member of our church community who is experienced in providing help and support at weddings). The Verger will be in the church 45 minutes before the start of the service, and the ushers should also arrive at the church at least 45 minutes before the service begins. They should make themselves known to the Verger. At the end of the service, the ushers should make sure that all guests' belongings are taken out of the church, spare Orders of Service are removed and the church is tidy.

Marriage Document & Marriage Certificates

Following the rule changes on May 4th 2021, we no longer issue you with your wedding certificate. You will no longer sign a marriage register or be given a Marriage Certificate during the ceremony instead you will sign a Marriage Document and copy. This is a one-page document which contains the details of both people getting married which are needed to register a marriage.

The Marriage Document will be issued by the Minister at the Church where your marriage is taking place and will contain all the details required to complete a marriage registration. In addition to your fathers details, other parent details will be able to be recorded ie mother, step-parent. Please keep us up to date with your details. The registrar has asked me to let you know of the complexity and £90 fee for applying for a correction at a later date.

Couples will be able to apply for certificates online: Marriage certificates can be ordered online at the Gloucestershire Registration Service website www.gloucestershire.gov.uk/births-marriages-deaths-and-civil-partnerships/order-certificates/ for dispatch within 7 calendar days. Certificates will be sent via Royal Mail 2nd class delivery service. Please note that the minister has 21 days in which to send the marriage document to the Registration Service.

Our churches

The Berkeley Benefice has three beautiful churches, each with their own charm and appeal. It is worth visiting each of these churches before making your final decision about the place you hold your wedding.

Our churches are places of regular worship, the spiritual home for our congregations, and also historic buildings. We are not able to make structural or decorative alterations to the buildings. Every effort will be made to present them for your use in the best possible condition.

Services in St Mary's, Berkeley

St Mary's, Berkeley is a fabulous grade II listed medieval church built in the 13th century. Seating up to 250 guests and boasting a choir, and large organ, this is the ideal setting for a traditional wedding. The church is situated next to Berkeley Castle and is a short walk from the centre of Berkeley. There is disabled access and limited disabled parking. Guests not requiring this access are requested to park in the town.

The Bridal party will enter via the north porch and door, allowing a private space for those last minute adjustments. Couples are encouraged to leave via the great West door and steps which provides photographic opportunities. Confetti may be thrown outside the West door only, petals and confetti may not be thrown in the church building.

The church has a robed choir which may be booked in advance and are able to provide music during the Registration of the Marriage (The choir may not be available for weekday and August services). The ringing of bells may be available on request for Saturday weddings accept in August (subject to availability). The Church has a beautiful organ for your hymn choices, however, a piano is available for accompaniment of other instrumentalists.

Services in All Saints', Stone

All Saints', Stone is a typical English village church. It seats around 100 guests and has an organ, and is ideal for those who want a less formal wedding. The church is close to the A38 giving access to local reception venues. There is no parking at the church but guests can park in the village. Although the church does not have WC facilities, a portable toilets can be hired on request.

The Bridal party will enter and leave via the south porch and door, allowing a private space for those last minute adjustments. Confetti may be thrown by the gated churchyard entrance only away from the church building. Petals and confetti may not be thrown in the church building.

All Saints' does not have a church choir. The ringing of bells may be available on request for Saturday weddings accept in August (subject to availability). The Church has a beautiful organ for your hymn choices, however, a piano is available for accompaniment of other instrumentalists.

Services in St Michael's, Hill

St Michael's, Hill is ideal for anyone who wants a rural wedding. This cozy little church can seat 80 guests and boasts fabulous rural views. There is limited parking at the church with further parking in the village at the bottom of the hill. The church has a WC and the majority of the building is on one level.

The Bridal party will enter and leave via the south porch and door, allowing a private space for those last minute adjustments. Confetti may be thrown by the gated churchyard entrance only away from the church building. Petals and confetti may not be thrown in the church building.

St Michael's does not have a church choir or bells. The Church has a small organ for your hymn choices and for accompaniment of other instrumentalists.

Fees for current year weddings

Please note:

- ◆Once you have made all the arrangements for the day with the minister, we will confirm the fees due and payment details
- ♦ Your deposit and Banns fee will be held on account.
- ♦ Fees must be paid at least 1 month prior to the wedding.
- Services for the Blessing of a marriage do not attract a fee for the publication of Banns, unless they are required to be read for a Marriage service in another Parish not associated with the Berkeley Benefice.

Preface

In the presence of God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit, we have come together to witness the marriage of *N* and *N*, to pray for God's blessing on them, to share their joy and to celebrate their love. Marriage is a gift of God in creation through which husband and wife may know the grace of God. It is given that as man and woman grow together in love and trust, they shall be united with one another in heart, body and mind, as Christ is united with his bride, the Church.

The gift of marriage brings husband and wife together in the delight and tenderness of sexual union and joyful commitment to the end of their lives. It is given as the foundation of family life in which children are [born and] nurtured and in which each member of the family, in good times and in bad, may find strength, companionship and comfort, and grow to maturity in love.

Marriage is a way of life made holy by God, and blessed by the presence of our Lord Jesus Christ with those celebrating a wedding at Cana in Galilee. Marriage is a sign of unity and loyalty which all should uphold and honour. It enriches society and strengthens community. No one should enter into it lightly or selfishly but reverently and responsibly in the sight of almighty God.

N and N are now to enter this way of life.

They will each give their consent to the other and make solemn vows, and in token of this they will [each] give and receive a ring.

We pray with them that the Holy Spirit will guide and strengthen them, that they may fulfil God's purposes for the whole of their earthly life together.

The Declarations

The minister says to the congregation

First, I am required to ask anyone present who knows a reason why these persons may not lawfully marry, to declare it now.

The minister says to the couple

The vows you are about to take are to be made in the presence of God, who is judge of all and knows all the secrets of our hearts; therefore if either of you knows a reason why you may not lawfully marry, you must declare it now.

The minister says to the bridegroom N, will you take N to be your wife? Will you love her, comfort her, honour and protect her, and, forsaking all others, be faithful to her as long as you both shall live?

He answers

I will.

The minister says to the bride N will you take N to be your husband? Will you love him, comfort him, honour and protect him, and, forsaking all others, be faithful to him as long as you both shall live?

She answers

I will.

The minister says to the congregation

Will you, the families and friends of *N* and *N*, support and uphold them in their marriage now and in the years to come?

All We will.

The Collect

The minister invites the people to pray, silence is kept and the minister says the Collect

God our Father, from the beginning, you have blessed creation with abundant life. Pour out your blessings upon *N* and *N*, that they may be joined in mutual love and companionship, in holiness and commitment to each other. We ask this through our Lord Jesus Christ your Son, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

All Amen.

Readings

(One reading from the Bible, and possibly one additional reading if required)

Address by the minister

A Hymn is sung The Marriage

The couple stand before the minister.

The Vows

The minister introduces the vows

N and *N*, I now invite you to join hands and make your vows, in the presence of God and his people.

The bride and bridegroom face each other holding each others hands. The bridegroom says I, N, take you, N, to be my wife, to have and to hold from this day forward; for better, for worse, for richer, for poorer, in sickness and in health, to love and to cherish, till death us do part; according to God's holy law. In the presence of God I make this vow.

The bride says

I, N, take you, N, to be my husband, to have and to hold from this day forward; for better, for worse, for richer, for poorer, in sickness and in health, to love and to cherish, till death us do part; according to God's holy law. In the presence of God I make this vow.

They loose hands.

The Giving of Rings

The minister receives the rings, and says

Heavenly Father, by your blessing, let these rings be to N and N a symbol of unending love and faithfulness, to remind them of the vow and covenant which they have made this day through Jesus Christ our Lord.

All Amen.

The bridegroom places the ring on the fourth finger of the bride's left hand and, holding it there, says

N, I give you this ring as a sign of our marriage. With my body I honour you, all that I am I give to you, and all that I have I share with you, within the love of God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

They loose hands and the bride places a ring on the fourth finger of the bridegroom's left hand and, holding it there, says

N, I give you this ring as a sign of our marriage. With my body I honour you, all that I am I give to you, and all that I have I share with you, within the love of God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

The Proclamation

The minister joins their hands together and says

In the presence of God, and before this congregation,

N and *N* have given their consent and made their marriage vows to each other. They have declared their marriage by the joining of hands and by the giving and receiving of rings. I therefore proclaim that they are husband and wife.

Those whom God has joined together let no one put asunder.

The Blessing of the Marriage

The husband and wife kneel, and the minister says

Blessed are you, O Lord our God, for you have created joy and gladness, pleasure and delight, love, peace and fellowship. Pour out the abundance of your blessing upon N and N in their new life together. Let their love for each other be a seal upon their hearts, and a crown upon their heads. Bless them in their work and in their companionship; awake and asleep, in joy and in sorrow, in life and in death. Finally, in your mercy, bring them to that banquet where your saints feast for ever in your heavenly home. We ask this through Jesus Christ your Son, our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

All Amen.

The minister says to the couple

God the Father, God the Son, God the Holy Spirit, bless, preserve and keep you; the Lord mercifully grant you the riches of his grace, that you may please him both in body and soul, and, living together in faith and love, may receive the blessings of eternal life.

All Amen.

Prayers

The prayers conclude with the Lord's Prayer.

All Our Father who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name, Thy kingdom come, Thy will be done, on earth as in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread.

And forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us. Lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil.

For thine is the kingdom, the power, and glory, for ever and ever.

Registration of the Marriage

Hymn

The minister says

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Sample Blessing Service

Husband and wife enter the church together, and walk along the aisle accompanied by bridesmaids, best man or men, and groomsmen.

The Welcome

The minister welcomes the people, introduces the service informally and invites those present to pray.

The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with you

All and also with you.

Prayer of Preparation

God our Father, you have taught us through your Son that love is the fulfilling of the law; grant to your servants N and N that, loving one another, they may continue in your love until their lives' end; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

All Amen.

Hymn

Preface

N and *N*, you stand in the presence of God as man and wife to dedicate to him your life together, that he may consecrate your marriage and empower you to keep the covenant and promise you have solemnly declared.

The Bible teaches us that marriage is a gift of God in creation and a means of his grace, a holy mystery in which man and woman become one flesh. It is God's purpose that, as husband and wife give themselves to each other in love throughout their lives, they shall be united in that love as Christ is united with his Church.

Marriage is given, that husband and wife may comfort and help each other, living faithfully together in need and in plenty, in sorrow and in joy. It is given, that with delight and tenderness they may know each other in love, and, through the joy of their bodily union, may strengthen the union of their hearts and lives. It is given as the foundation of family life in which children may be [born and] nurtured in accordance with God's will, to his praise and glory. This is the meaning of the marriage you have made.

You now wish to affirm you desire to live as followers of Christ, and you have come to him, the fountain of grace, that strengthened by the prayers of the Church, you may be enabled to fulfil your marriage vows in love and faithfulness.

Let us keep silence and remember God's presence with us now.

God is love, and those who live in love live in God and God lives in them.

The Collect

The minister invites the people to pray, silence is kept and the minister says the Collect

God our Father, you taught us through your Son that love is the fulfilling of the law. Grant to your servants that, loving one another, they may continue in your love until their lives' end: through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

All Amen.

The Dedication

N and *N*, you have committed yourselves to each other in marriage, and your marriage is recognised by law.

The minister says to the husband

N, have you resolved to be faithful to your wife, forsaking all others, so long as you both shall live?

The husband says

I have, with the help of God.

The minister says to the wife

N, have you resolved to be faithful to your husband, forsaking all others, so long as you both shall live?

The wife says

I have, with the help of God.

The minister says to the congregation

Will you, the family and friends of *N* and *N*, continue to support and uphold them in their marriage now and in the years to come?

All We will.

Readings

(One reading from the Bible, and possibly one additional reading if required)

Address by the minister Hymn

Renewal of Vows

The minister says to the couple

I invite you now to recall the vows that you made at your wedding.

Husband and wife face each other and hold hands. The husband says I, N, took you, N, to be my wife;

The wife says

I, N, took you, N, to be my husband;

The couple say together

to have and to hold from that day forward, for better, for worse, for richer, for poorer, in sickness and in health, to love and to cherish, till death us do part, according to God's holy law, and this was our solemn vow.

Today, in the presence of our family and friends, we affirm our continuing commitment to this vow.

The Rings

The couple join their left hands and the minister says

Heavenly Father, source of everlasting love,

revealed to us in Jesus Christ and poured into our hearts through your Holy Spirit; that love which many waters cannot quench, neither the floods drown; that love which is patient and kind, enduring all things without end;

by your blessing, let these rings be to N and N symbols to remind them of the covenant made on their wedding day, through your grace in the love of your Son and in the power of your Spirit.

All Amen.

The couple each hold the others wedding ring and say these words together I gave you this ring as a sign of our marriage. With my body I honour you, all that I am I give to you, and all that I have I share with you, within the love of God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

Prayers

The couple kneel together and say these words.

Heavenly Father, we offer you our souls and bodies, our thoughts and words and deeds, our love for one another. Unite our wills in your will, that we may grow together in love and peace all the days of our life; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen

The minister says

Almighty God give you grace to persevere, that he may complete in you the works he has already begun, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

All Amen.

The Lord bless and watch over you, the Lord make his face to shine upon you and be gracious to you, the Lord look kindly on you and give you peace all the days of your life.

All Amen.

God the Father, God the Son, God the Holy Spirit, bless, preserve and keep you; the Lord mercifully grant you the riches of his grace, that you may please him both in body and soul, and, living together in faith and love, may receive the blessings of eternal life.

All Amen.

The Lord's Prayer

The prayers conclude with the Lord's Prayer.

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Music in your wedding or blessing

In choosing to be married in one of our churches in a traditional Church of England wedding, music can be an important and wonderful part of your marriage service. Here is information about the organist, choir and hymns.

Musical Director

The Musical Director for all parishes is Mr David Furnival (01453 819128 or david_furnival@btinternet.com). If he is unavailable, we have deputies who are also talented and capable musicians. An organist will be supplied for each service to play for hymns and any incidental music.

Choir

A choir maybe available by special arrangement and subject to availability in St Mary's, Berkeley only. If you are considering having a choir, please inform the Minister as soon as possible

Choosing hymns

It is usual to have three hymns at a wedding or blessing. Try and choose hymns that will be familiar and also reflect what is happening during the service: a cheerful, bright hymn to start and end with and a gentler, reflective hymn in the middle of the service before you make your solemn vows. There are some suggestions at the end of this guide, these are the first lines of the hymn which you can use to google the words and tunes.

- ♦ Be thou my vision, O Lord of my heart
- ◆Make me a channel of your peace
- ◆Amazing grace

Uplifting, thankful hymns for the end of the service

- ◆ And did those feet in ancient times ("Jerusalem")

- ♦ Guide me, O thou great Redeemer
- ◆Immortal, invisible, God only wise
- ◆Lead us, heavenly Father, lead us
- ♦ Now thank we all our God

Suggested Readings

These readings are from the New Revised Standard Version of the Bible, but you can choose other versions—and one additional readings if you wish.

1 Corinthians 13: The Gift of Love

If I speak in the tongues of mortals and of angels, but do not have love, I am a noisy gong or a clanging cymbal. And if I have prophetic powers, and understand all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have all faith, so as to remove mountains, but do not have love, I am nothing. If I give away all my possessions, and if I hand over my body so that I may boast, but do not have love, I gain nothing.

Love is patient; love is kind; love is not envious or boastful or arrogant or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice in wrongdoing, but rejoices in the truth. It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things.

Love never ends. But as for prophecies, they will come to an end; as for tongues, they will cease; as for knowledge, it will come to an end. For we know only in part, and we prophesy only in part; but when the complete comes, the partial will come to an end. When I was a child, I spoke like a child, I thought like a child, I reasoned like a child; when I became an adult, I put an end to childish ways. For now we see in a mirror, dimly, but then we will see face to face. Now I know only in part; then I will know fully, even as I have been fully known. And now faith, hope, and love abide, these three; and the greatest of these is love.

Song of Solomon 2 v 10-13 & Song of Solomon 8 v 6,7 A love poem

My beloved speaks and says to me: 'Arise, my love, my fair one, come away; for now the winter is past, rain is over and gone. The flowers appear on the earth; the time of singing has come, and the voice of the turtle-dove is heard in our land. The fig tree puts forth its figs, the vines are in blossom; they give forth fragrance. Arise, my love, my fair one, come away.

Set me as a seal upon your heart, as a seal upon your arm; for love is strong as death, passion fierce as the grave. Its flashes are flashes of fire, raging flame. Many waters cannot quench love, neither can floods drown it. If one offered for love the wealth of one's house, it would be utterly scorned.

John 2 v 1-11: Jesus at the Wedding at Cana

On the third day there was a wedding in Cana of Galilee, and the mother of Jesus was there. Jesus and his disciples had also been invited to the wedding. When the wine gave out, the mother of Jesus said to him, 'They have no wine.' And Jesus said to her, 'Woman, what concern is that to you and to me? My hour has not yet come.' His mother said to the servants, 'Do whatever he tells you.'

Now standing there were six stone water-jars for the Jewish rites of purification, each holding twenty or thirty gallons. Jesus said to them, 'Fill the jars with water.' And they filled them up to the brim. He said to them, 'Now draw some out, and take it to the chief steward.' So they took it.

When the steward tasted the water that had become wine, and did not know where it came from (though the servants who had drawn the water knew), the steward called the bridegroom and said to him, 'Everyone serves the good wine first, and then the inferior wine after the guests have become drunk. But you have kept the good wine until now.'

Jesus did this, the first of his signs, in Cana of Galilee, and revealed his glory; and his disciples believed in him.

Colossians 3 v 12-17: Building a loving relationship

As God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, meekness, and patience. Bear with one another and, if anyone has a complaint against another, forgive each other; just as the Lord has forgiven you, so you also must forgive. Above all, clothe yourselves with love, which binds everything together in perfect harmony. And let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, to which indeed you were called in the one body. And be thankful. Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly; teach and admonish one another in all wisdom; and with gratitude in your hearts sing psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs to God. And whatever you do, in word or deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him.

Ephesians 5 v 21-33: Committing to each other

Be subject to one another out of reverence for Christ.

Wives, be subject to your husbands as you are to the Lord. For the husband is the head of the wife just as Christ is the head of the church, the body of which he is the Saviour. Just as the church is subject to Christ, so also wives ought to be, in everything, to their husbands.

Husbands, love your wives, just as Christ loved the church and gave himself up for her, in order to make her holy by cleansing her with the washing of water by the word, so as to present the church to himself in splendour, without a spot or wrinkle or anything of the kind—yes, so that she may be holy and without blemish.

In the same way, husbands should love their wives as they do their own bodies. He who loves his wife loves himself. For no one ever hates his own body, but he nourishes and tenderly cares for it, just as Christ does for the church, because we are members of his body.

`For this reason a man will leave his father and mother and be joined to his wife, and the two will become one flesh.' This is a great mystery, and I am applying it to Christ and the church. Each of you, however, should love his wife as himself, and a wife should respect her husband.

Philippians 4 v 4-9: Seeing the good side

Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice. Let your gentleness be known to everyone. The Lord is near. Do not worry about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.

Finally, beloved, whatever is true, whatever is honourable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is pleasing, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence and if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things. Keep on doing the things that you have learned and received and heard and seen in me, and the God of peace will be with you.

1 John 4 v 7-12: God Is Love

Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God; everyone who loves is born of God and knows God. Whoever does not love does not know God, for God is love. God's love was revealed among us in this way: God sent his only Son into the world so that we might live through him. In this is love, not that we loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the atoning sacrifice for our sins. Beloved, since God loved us so much, we also ought to love one another. No one has ever seen God; if we love one another, God lives in us, and his love is perfected in us.
